the written regulation and your inspector has interpreted it differently you may ask for a desk review. The regulations are to provide direction and clarity so that we can operate a safe and secure setting for children, they are not written as a wedge against providers. If we handle the situation in a professional, respectful partnership all will gain from the experience, and then we need to communicate with other providers to help facilitate change.

If you haven't yet heard about Virginia's Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS) for home daycares then be aware that changes are forthcoming. The program is currently in the test phase for daycare centers and it will roll out to all after the results are analyzed. States that currently have a similar program are North Carolina, West Virginia and Pennsylvania. The reason for the program is to improve the quality of care, the structure of the environment, interactions with children, and the overall learning environment for children. The goal of

QRIS is to provide financial motivation to achieve, participate and improve the quality of care in a home setting. We will continue to update the progress of the program as more information becomes available.

I would like to recognize our partners with the USDA, Places and Programs and The Planning Council for their continued support and generous training provided to our association every month. We truly appreciate all effort and guidance they provide to our attendees during our training sessions, we couldn't facilitate that portion of the meetings without them. Thank you for your support.



Keeping Our Children Safe and Avoiding Violations

Remember it is "gum ball" time of the year again. Gum balls are sharp and can result in injury to children.

Fireplaces MUST be inspected annually, even if you do not use it.

Regulation 4.5 regarding barriers:

Licensing does not consider cribs as barriers. Potentially hazardous substances must be inaccessible to the children and there may be no potential hazards in the room(s) where children sleep in cribs. Doors must have child proof latches or door knob covers to keep children from entering other areas or accessing hazardous areas.

Syrup of Ipecac is required. If you cannot find this product, ask your local pharmacist to order it for you. Explain that DSS licensing regulations requires that you keep it in your first aid kit.

You need a state license if you care for six or more children.

MONEY SAVING TIPS

It's quite obvious the country is now in an economic slump compared to that of the great depression. What, if any, strategies are you using to save money? Send us your ideas and we will post in upcoming editions, or better yet, we can send out in an email so we can all take advantage of your tips quicker.

Food - check out all the grocery stores in your area including the Dollar Tree, Big Lots, etc. Don't overlook the bakery outlet stores. Check out Angel Food Ministries to see if this could also help your family. Use coupons if you can, some stores are doubling the coupon on certain days. If you are over 55, don't be afraid to ask any store you shop in if they have a senior citizen discount - each store might have a different age.

Plan your menus around the store specials each week. Dig into those cookbooks you have or search the internet for new recipies. Sometimes you can get more than 1 meal from a dinner. For example, bake a whole chicken or 2, or 3 at the same time. The first meal can be sliced chicken breast. For the 2nd meal, cut up the thighs & legs and add cream of chicken, or mushroom soup. Serve with rice or noodles, vegetable and fruit of your choice. If you have some left, you can make chicken salad for a sandwich. For any left overs, place in a baggie and freeze for later use. Make sure to put date and name of contents on the bag. If you have some ground meat, roll into meatballs. The first night you can make spaghetti with meat balls, the next night can be meat ball subs, then if there are any meatballs left, break down into small pieces and make chili. If you have a beef roast, cook in oven or slow cooker, slice the first night. Another night cube some to make beef stew, and with any left overs, chop up and make home made vegetable beef soup. The winter months are a great time to make the hearty caseroles and soups.
