Cake Mix Cookies

Chocolate Chip Cookies

1 package yellow cake mix 2 eggs
1 cup chocolate chips $\frac{1}{2}$ cup oil

Combine cake mix, chocolate chips, oil, & eggs in a mixing bowl. Form golf ball sized balls of dough and place on baking sheet. Bake at 350 for 10-12 minutes.

Lemon Crinkle Cookies

1 package lemon cake mix 1/3 cup oil Powdered sugar 2 eggs Combine cake mix, oil, and eggs in a mixing bowl. Form golf ball sized balls of dough and cover with powdered sugar and place on baking sheet. Bake at 350 for 10-12 minutes

Smores Cookies

1 package chocolate cake mix 2 eggs $\frac{3}{4}$ cup crushed graham crackers 1/2 cup oil $\frac{3}{4}$ cup marshmallows Combine cake mix, marshmallows, graham crackers, oil, & eggs in a mixing bowl. Form golf ball-sized balls of cookie dough and transfer to baking sheet. Bake at 350 for 10-12 minutes.

Save Plastic Lids

I recently found out about a program where the Navy is making prosthetics out of plastic lids. Instead of throwing your plastic lids in the trash, please consider saving them and bring to our trainings to give to Marie. As long as it is plastic they will accept it. Ask your daycare families and neighbors to hop on board and participate in this very worthwhile program with us.

Plastic Grocery Bags

If you aren't planning to reuse your plastic grocery bags, please bring them to PFCEA trainings. A woman in Chesapeake is transforming them into mats for homeless people. They cannot accept the thin newspaper bags, produce bags, dry cleaning or thick shiny garment bags from department stores.

It is called the Greater Hampton Rds. Diaper Bank. It is run by Cher Leadbeater who is a part of the National Diaper Bank Network. She runs this organization out of her house. Her goal is to provide diapers/pampers to parents who cannot afford to buy them. Since last year requests for diapers has gone from 90,000 to 100,000 a month. She is only able to fill about 20,000 of those requests. Many of those requests come from local organizations that help parents in need. 1 out of 3 parents struggle to buy diapers. They are sometimes forced to reuse or leave on longer, which can lead to health issues such as diaper rash or worse.

I would like to encourage our Association to help this cause. I have made it easy to do. All you need to do is bring any unused diapers /pullups that are no longer needed to any training and I will take them home to be picked from Ms. Leadbeater.

Tips for Providers

Make sure parents fill out every line in all paperwork.

Central registry checks, child protective services, etc. need to be filled out for family members.

If you have assistants make sure all of their paperwork is up to date.

If you are a subsidy provider, you must create a written lockdown procedure.

Make sure parents sign in and out each day.

Infants should not have any blankets or soft bedding and always laid down on their backs.

Make sure your portable battery operated weather band radio is working properly

If you have anything dangerous in cabinets that are within reach of children, latch the cabinets.

Wiggle Your Fingers, Stomp Your Feet!

Wiggle your fingers in the air.
Wiggle them, wiggle them everywhere!
Stomp your feet upon the ground.
Stomp them, stomp them all around.



Now sit down and cross your feet. Hands in lap, nice and neat. Now we are ready to start our day. We'll listen first, and then we'll play!



On average, 37 U.S. children die in hot cars every year, (approx. 1 every 9 days)



CONTRIBUTING FACTORS



A change in daily routine, lack of sleep, stress, fatigue, and simple distractions are things ALL new parents experience and are the reasons children have been unknowingly left alone in vehicles.


AGE OF VICTIMS



Age 3 and younger.

87% of children who have died from vehicular heat stroke are age 3 and younger.

CIRCUMSTANCES



In an overwhelming majority of child vehicular heatstroke deaths, it was an otherwise loving, responsible parent that unknowingly left the child.

55% Unknowingly left

28% Got in on their own

13% Knowingly left

4% UNK

CHILD VEHICULAR HEAT STROKE FACT SHEET

Vehicular heat stroke is largely misunderstood by the general public. The majority of parents are misinformed and would like to believe that they could never "forget" their child in the backseat of a vehicle. This is the most dangerous mistake a parent or caregiver can ever make!

Two-thirds (2/3) of the increase in temperature in a car happens in the first 20 minutes.

Children have died in hot cars when the outside temperature was as low as 60 degrees.

Cracking the windows does NOT help slow the heating process OR decrease the maximum temperature.

A child's body overheats 3-5 times faster than an adult body.



GREENHOUSE EFFECT IN VEHICLES

The inside of a vehicle heats up VERY quickly!

Even with the windows cracked, the **temperature inside** a car can reach 125 degrees in minutes.




